BRICK + BEAM DETROIT

OVERVIEW

Detroit has a unique, character-rich building stock, but much of the city's neighborhood fabric has been decimated by abandonment and blight, there is therefore an urgent need to deal with vacant and neglected buildings. Detroiters have long been reinvesting in their – and sometimes their neighbor's - properties through the city's toughest times. A recent crop of new residents are planting roots in Detroit, buying vacant or neglected structures and investing sweat equity into rehabbing them. However, these rehabs and reinvestments are happening piecemeal with little knowledge of one another's projects or lessons learned – or knowledge of each other. There is a need for a centralized support network to connect rehabbers and property owners with resources and one another. Recognizing the complexity of rehabbing buildings married with unique complexities present in Detroit, the Michigan Historic Preservation Network, Detroit Future City Implementation Office (DFC), and Preservation Detroit have joined together to provide access to resources, share knowledge and talent, help demystify the process, and call building rehabbers to action.

- Number of participants in attendance and the diversity of their geographies across the city

OBJECTIVES

- Use Online mapping of rehab projects to show where and what type of investment is happening.
- Host content-rich social gatherings to provide low-key opportunities for rehabbers, tradespeople, or just the rehab-curious to meet each other, share stories, and turn engagement into action by inspiring next steps
- Organize peer- and expert-led hands-on and informational classes to build on existing talent and foster new talent while empowering property owners with the skills they need to tackle projects
- Create an online library of resources including detailed how-tos on subjects ranging from permitting to financing, including powerpoints and handouts from classes
- Distribute a physical 'Launch Box' to provide tangible tools, offer opportunities for next steps and a way to get connected to Brick+Beam and other organizations
- Launch an online forum for Q&A, tips, and recommendations for local contractors to help build a cache for rehabbers to use as a reference for their own projects
- Partner with complementary organizations to ensure that Brick + Beam is leveraging other work being done around the city and having a broad reach

In January 2015 contributing organizations participated in the Knight Foundation's Urban Prototyping Bootcamp with IDEO, a creative consulting firm, and a team from Parsons New School of Design. (This culminated in a prototyping weekend in March held in Detroit where ideas were tested with over 100 people from across Detroit participating and giving their feedback.)

Brick + Beam was selected as a Knight Cities Challenge winner in March.

Monthly programming and website - Knight Cities Challenge grant period began July 2015 and will continue through October 2016. The project will be seeking funding to continue beyond the grant.
