

Detroit Future City Mid-Year Newsletter


From vacant lot transformations to planning for industrial property reuse, Detroit Future City (DFC) has been hard at work to advance the quality of life in Detroit. In this mid-year newsletter, we profile a few of the projects you may not have heard about.

Did you know that DFC has awarded nearly \$250,000 to transform vacant lots in Detroit neighborhoods?

Our Field Guide to Working with Lots Mini-Grant program has put nearly \$250,000 into the hands of Detroit organizations to help fund vacant lot transformations. This year alone, we awarded a combined total of \$95,000 to ten organizations to turn vacant lots in their neighborhoods into beautiful, intentional open spaces, using *Field Guide* designs. Six projects have already been completed this year and four are underway. A tour of completed lots was held on June 20, so that grantees could share their experiences and gain inspiration from each other's efforts.



Lots to Maintain

2018 is the third year of our mini-grant program. To help keep past installations looking good, DFC is launching a new program called Lots to Maintain. Through this program, grantees from 2016 can apply for up to \$1500 to support the upkeep and sustainability of their past installation projects.

Did you know DFC leads a community-based coalition to help Detroiters understand the benefits of stormwater management?

The Land + Water WORKS Coalition was formed in 2017 to equip Detroit residents with the resources needed to become better stewards of their environment. On March 21, 2018, more than 150 people attended the Land +Water WORKS Summit to hear local and



green stormwater infrastructure has the potential to positively transform the landscape of Detroit and improve the health of our communities and water resources. In addition to the city-wide

Summit, more than ten additional forums and workshops were held in neighborhoods and council districts across the city throughout the spring and early summer. The coalition also worked to develop 45 residents and nonprofits into community-based land and water stewardship experts who engaged thousands

By capturing water in a <u>rain barrel</u> for later use, installing a <u>rain garden</u> in your yard, or incorporating pervious surfaces into your landscaping that allow water to flow directly into the ground, you can help manage stormwater! 
If you attended the Land + Water WORKS Summit, or one of the workshops or forums,

Did you know Detroit has over 900 vacant industrial buildings, and DFC is developing a framework for their reuse?

Although Detroit retains a strong manufacturing base, there are over 900 vacant industrial buildings that will likely never be reused for their original purpose. DFC has assembled a team of industry leading consultants including SmithGroupJJR and Mass Economics to explore innovative opportunities for adaptive building reuse. The team identified vacant industrial redevelopment models that could be applied at the building, district and systemwide levels, drawing on examples from around the country and around the world.

In the next phase of the study, we will partner with the Detroit Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC), Vanguard CDC and others to begin a planning process in the

Milwaukee Junction neighborhood. Milwaukee Junction is a historically industrial area undergoing a rebirth as a creative, mixed-use commercial, industrial and residential district. We'd like to give a special thanks to all


